

2023 EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP: EMPOWERING YOUNG LEADERS

VISION:

• LEAD is a pathway for all young people to be leaders of positive change.

MISSION:

• Use the values of LEAD – Listen, Empathize, Act, Drive - to empower young people, including in underserved communities, with the skills to lead change in their own lives and in their world.

METHOD:

- The brainchild of acclaimed education visionary, Marilyn Field MSM, LEAD guides young people in how to lead positive change in their own lives and in their community.
- LEAD harnesses the actions of Listen, Empathize, Act and Drive to be a leader:
- L Listen openly to what others say so you can see a wider world beyond your own experiences.
- E Empathize with how others think and feel. Openly accept how they are different from you.
- A Actions speak louder than words. What do you want to say? Do it.
- D Drive yourself and your idea to completion. What powers you to keep going?
- Schools and organizations adopt the LEAD program into their own schedule. The young people practise the LEAD values. When they each take 100 LEAD actions, they receive the LEAD Medallion.

LEAD and its organization called **youthLEADarts** fosters personal growth in young people, allowing them to shed pre-existing labels and step outside of difficult life circumstances to see their world with hope and opportunities.

As each school class of students explore a theme of their choice, they engage in a series of arts workshops in drama, dance, literature/spoken-word, music, visual arts, photography / videography, media and Indigenous arts activities, mentored by the experience of Indigenous Elders, cultural knowledge keepers and arts-educators. They feel empowered to be leaders.



youthLEADarts relies on donations of \$10,000 per school community to deliver these programs.







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BACKGROUND:

Education Visionary, Marilyn Field, MSM:

- Teacher Marilyn Field founded DAREarts in 1994 and LEAD in 2020 as charities to empower children, using the arts. She and arts educators have reached over 220,000 children across Canada.
- Their methods prove that the arts can give children the confidence, courage and voice to LEAD change.

Artist-Educators Lead youthLEADarts Workshops Across Canada:

- youthLEADarts is comprised of acclaimed artist-educators from all disciplines across Canada who use the arts to transform young lives.
- They inspire youths to be leaders through the arts and the LEAD values of Listen, Empathize, Act and Drive.
- **youthLEADarts** has strong roots in underserved communities across Canada, after launching with 60 youngsters in BC and Quebec in 2020 and Nova Scotia in 2022.
- **youthLEADarts** provides outstanding resources with experienced personnel to help everyone stay connected and motivated to learn.

EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP:

1) BUILD YOUNG LEADERS IN COMMUNITIES ACROSS CANADA:

- Addressing Calls to Action from '*The Truth and Reconciliation Commission*', a national team of experienced artist-educators and Indigenous Elders work with students in grades 6/7/8 alongside community schoolteachers.
- Up to 30 students engage in a series of up to 10 daylong workshops in person and online. Engaging in dance, drama, music, spoken word, visual art, photography, videography and Indigenous arts, they collectively create their own multi-arts productions as they find their voice.
- Students explore how the values of **LEAD** Listen, Empathize, Act and Drive are important to nurture in themselves and in others. They gain confidence, communication, collaboration and leadership skills as they see how their voices elicit change and inspire hope.

2) CONNECT YOUNG LEADERS NATIONALLY and INTERNATIONALLY ONLINE:

- Young leaders from underserved communities further build leadership skills by connecting online through <u>www.youthLEADarts.com</u>, You-Tube, Instagram and Tik-Tok.
- Artist-educators act as mentors as the young people share their ideas and voices online.
- LEAD's reach enables young people to appreciate the value of diversity and inclusion with a wider perspective beyond their own.
